DEAR TEACHERS AND STUDENTS,

The Vinnies Youth Team is delighted to share with you the 2024 Vinnies Christmas Appeal Schools Kit to assist you and your school community in facilitating this year's Appeal.

This year, the Vinnies Christmas Appeal focuses on the **continuing impacts of the cost-of-living crisis in Australia**, with a particular emphasis on the devastating and unrelenting impacts as the crisis continues to impact individuals and families across the country.

This Christmas, more families are experiencing poverty and are on the brink of homelessness due to the relentless rising cost-of-living in Australia. The crisis has been an ongoing issue impacting Australians for over two years with no sign of reprieve. As the crisis deepens, so does the amount of people turning to Vinnies for support.

In the last year, Vinnies has seen a growing number of people relying on support from our services to get by – many of which are seeking assistance for the first time. A combination of housing unaffordability, high interest rates, modest growth of wages, and the rising cost of grocery and utility bills are pushing more households to the brink. As a result, more people are calling on the Society to provide lifelines and support in meeting basic needs.

The Bi-annual Vinnies WA Emergency Relief report found that 89% of families who sought our support said that their immediate needs were met through our assistance. 45% said their financial resilience and capabilities had improved since seeking help from Vinnies. 62% feel that they are able to maintain stable and secure housing. 56% have found that their circumstances have improved since coming to Vinnies.

Here at Vinnies, our dedicated Members, volunteers and staff work tirelessly to address the challenging realities that many Australians face on a daily basis. The materials and funds raised through the Vinnies Christmas Appeal



are essential in allowing the Society to respond to the growing demand for support and to help ensure that assistance reaches those in need to relieve the additional pressures of the festive season.

The following suite of activities have been compiled by Vinnies Youth staff for use of school communities during the 2024 Vinnies Christmas Appeal. In this pack, you will learn about the ongoing and relentless impacts of the cost-of-living crisis, ways to give and activities for students to learn about inflation as a social justice issue which perpetuates disadvantage.

Your school's support of the Vinnies Christmas Appeal will not only provide much needed relief to Australians who are currently burdened by a daily struggle of survival, comfort and dignity, but will also gift joy and hope this holiday season.

Thank you very much for taking the time to promote the Vinnies Christmas Appeal and for your contributions towards the critical work of the St Vincent de Paul Society.

CASE STUDY: TANIA'S STORY

Gaining a community of support

Tania has faced more challenges in a few years than most people face in a lifetime.

Relationship breakdowns. Mental health diagnoses. Homelessness.

Through the toughest of days, she has persevered because of a constant source of hope.

"I just look at my kids and that's why I keep going."

Raising a teenage son and younger twin daughters as a single mother, the continued cost of living crisis has had devastating and unrelenting impacts for families like Tania's, who try to stretch their finances further as costs keep going up.

"At the end of a fortnight, I have \$53 and I don't get paid until Friday."

"I'll work out how much money I've got per day for the fortnight... I can't just go to the shops



and go, 'we'll get this, this and this' without knowing a budget."

"I have to pay for medication, it's \$20, but that's \$20 in fuel or something else."

"It means that we have to stay home and have two-minute noodles for the next couple of days – it is what it is, [my daughter] needs those antibiotics."

"If I have to go without, I will go without."

Thankfully, Vinnies has been able to ease the load for Tania with meals that fit in with her family's dietary requirements.

First coming into contact with the St Vincent de Paul Society when she received a notice to vacate her rental property, Vinnies caseworkers were able to provide immediate support with food and clothing.

Gaining further assistance with referral services, including essential prescriptions for her twin daughters who live with chronic asthma, the ongoing support culminated in a transformative



moment where she was offered a place through community housing that she now calls her forever home.

“I surprised my kids on the Friday when I picked them up, we started moving in that night, and then had our first night on the Saturday.”

“It’s home – safety, stability.”

Tania regards the support she has received from Vinnies as a community, “it’s not just one person that deals with you, it’s everyone coming in to help.”

“Vinnies go above and beyond; they’ve gotten to know me and I’m so grateful.”

This community is far-reaching with St Vincent de Paul Society WA members supporting close to 60,000 people over the past year.

This alarming figure – rising by more than 10% from the previous 12 months – has placed significant strain on the most basic of needs with four in five people requesting food assistance and many people experiencing housing stress.

People in Tania’s circumstances – sole parents with dependents – made up close to a third of the people seeking assistance.

The rising cost of living remains an ever-present issue for Tania, as she works to manage competing expenses that result in having to make choices that no one should have to weigh up.

These choices are heartbreaking and reflect the demand for support at all times of year, but especially at Christmas.

Our Conference members know how important it is for many families to receive some extra help at this time of the year, which is why they start preparing for Christmas hampers well in advance.

With the support of Vinnies in place, Tania is looking towards the Christmas season with renewed hope.

“It’s not just a one-day event, it’s the lead up to it – I love the anticipation – I know what they’re getting, but I’m so excited to see them get it!

“Watching their faces light up while we’re making Christmas breakfast, whether it’s pancakes or bacon and eggs, and then getting to go and open up presents... they’re so excited and watching them playing with them.

“My present is seeing my kids happy and seeing their faces light up.”

The St Vincent de Paul Society has been able to make a difference in the lives of Tania and her family, but so many more still need support in their time of need.

COST OF LIVING PRESSURES 2024



This year's Christmas Appeal is focused on the continuing impact of the cost of living pressures. These suggested speaking notes can be adapted to the audience or year group of your students to encourage their participation in this year's campaign.

The cost of living is defined as how much money it takes to afford life's necessities, such as food, housing, transportation, healthcare, utilities and taxes.

What are we paying for groceries?

- Australians are spending an extra \$37 per week on groceries, an additional \$1,934 per year.
- A loaf of white bread cost \$3.40 on average in 2019. It now costs \$4.45.
- The cost of a packet of spaghetti has increased by 11% on average since 2019.
- Cheese has increased on average by 23% since 2021.
- The cost of butter has gone up by 9% since 2022.
- Cereals have increased by 20% since 2022, a breakfast cereal that cost \$4.86 in 2022, now costs \$5.73 on average.
- Kitchen staples (sauce, flour, rice etc) have gone up by 44% on average in a year in some supermarket chains.

How does this affect your food budget?

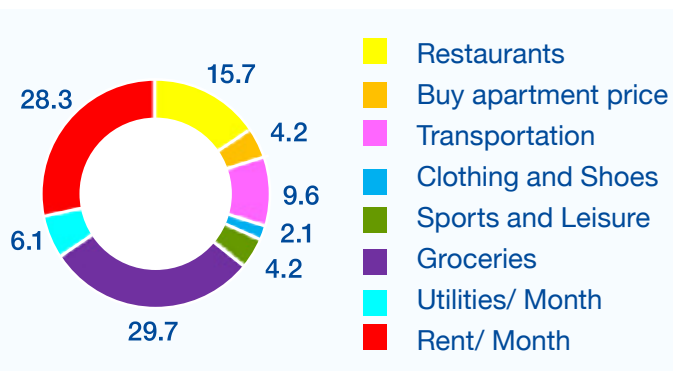
- In over a year, a serving of breakfast cereal and milk has increased by 10c. For two children, eating cereal every day, that an increase of over \$70 per year.
- Let's say a family of four like to eat ham sandwiches on white bread. In 2019, this would have cost your family \$1.57 per serve. In 2024, it now costs \$1.99 per serve. For four people, three times a week, that means an extra cost of \$262 per year.
- A pasta dinner, not factoring in sauce or topping, three times a week, is now costing you an extra \$37 on average per year than it did in 2020.

Out of 2989 private rentals available to rent in Western Australia, it was found that:

- No properties were affordable for a single person on JobSeeker Payment.
- A single person on a Disability Support Pension could afford 1 property.
- 13 out of the 2989 rentals were affordable for a couple on an Age Pension.
- 17 properties were available for a single person on minimum wage.
- 38 properties were affordable for couples on one minimum wage and parenting payment.

TO GIVE HAMPERS, FOOD, OR GIFTS

Your local Conference Members are doing good works in the community every week and are best placed to understand the needs of the people they serve.

Usually Conferences are excited to receive your hampers, although it may be preferable in *some* circumstances to give gift cards or financially instead. Check in with your local Conference to find out!

Where do the hampers go?

Hampers are delivered to families in your community who have called upon Vinnies for a hand-up.

To uphold the dignity of those receiving the hamper, please ensure that all food items are not due to expire for at least 6 months. All items must be non-perishable and undamaged. Look out for packaged food with a Health Star Rating of 3.5 or above. The more stars, the better!

Tip: One way to organise the hampers is to allocate families to different classrooms. Consider the needs of the family, and adjust the hamper accordingly.

SEE THINK DO: TANIA'S STORY



Context: Refer to the case study about Tania's story and read together as a class.

Age group: Suitable for primary and secondary school students

Resources:

- Compass worksheet (see next page)
- Pens/pencils

Run time: 30-45 minutes

Activity Description:

1. Provide each student with a Compass worksheet

2. Ask each student to complete the worksheet using the following compass points:

E = EMOTIONS:

What do you feel after hearing Tania's story? What emotions does it make you feel? What might you feel if you were in this situation?

W = WORRIES:

What worries do you have for Tania and families like hers? What worries do you think Tania has leading into Christmas?

N = NEEDS:

What are some of the needs that Tania and others like her might have? What basic needs do we all have that might not be being met for families like Tania's?

S = SUPPORT:





Where can families like Tania's get the support they need? What role might you play in helping with this?

3. Share the thinking: Share your compass point responses with the rest of the class. Are there any common themes in each of the categories?

12 DAYS OF CHRISTMAS

Here are some ideas for what you could do in the lead-up to Christmas to spread hope and joy!

Age group: Suitable for primary and secondary school students

Run time: 30-40 minutes a day

1

PRAY FOR THOSE IN NEED

Think about those who need God's help this Christmas, whether it's for healing over sickness, loneliness, needing a safe place to live, or something else.

Then take the time in a quiet space by yourself to pray for each person and their needs.

You might also invite your family, classmates, or friends to pray with you at a special time.

2

SEND A MESSAGE OF HOPE

Writing a handmade Christmas Card is a great way to uplift someone in-need this holiday season.

You can put your personal touch by designing the card yourself and adding a message of hope inside. You don't need to write your name on the card, just a simple Christmas message will do. Your local Conference Members will be sure to give it to someone special.

3

END A HELPING HAND

What can you do to lend a helping hand to those who help us?

Could you do some extra chores at home for your parents or carers? Could you do it not for pocket money, but to show you care?

Maybe you could help your teachers at school with end of year cleaning in the classroom. Or maybe you have a friend that needs a helping hand – reach out for a chat, and see how you might be able to help.

4

CAROLS AND CAKES

Plan and hold a Christmas-themed bake sale to raise funds for those in need. You may like to compliment your bake sale with a carolling performance to spread the Christmas cheer!

Carolling is a wonderful way to connect during the Christmas season, and if you enjoy rehearsing and performing carols, you may like to reach out to a local aged care centre or community group to spread further cheer. You can record your carols and send digitally or do it in person!

5

CREATE A SENSE OF WELCOME

Take time to reflect on what makes you feel welcomed into a space. Is it the body language and tone of the person greeting you? Is it the atmosphere, the feel of a space?

The feeling of being welcomed increases a sense of belonging, and working actively to create this feeling for those around us can do a lot to reduce feelings of isolation.

After reflecting on what makes you feel welcome, try to practice creating this in spaces for others when you can.

6

PACK-A-LUNCH

Some students out there don't always go to school with a full lunch box. Collecting and packing non-perishable items for lunch boxes can be a wonderful way to support families and students experiencing hardship this Christmas. If you don't have an extra lunch box to donate, a zip-lock bag can be used too. Items may include:

- Juice boxes
- Muesli bars
- Tins of tuna
- Soup sachets
- 'Fun size' chip packets
- Fruit cups
- Single-serve packs of biscuits or crackers
- Shelf-stable dips like 'Le Snack'.

7

HOLD A FUNDRAISER OR DONATION DRIVE

Plan a fundraising event and donate the money collected!

Donate money raised during a fundraising event (e.g. Op Shop fashion parade, Minute to Win It competitions, pyjama day) to the Vinnies Christmas Appeal, or donate food* (can be in hampers) to your local Conference so they can distribute it among those in need in your local community.

SPREAD GRATITUDE AND CHEER IN THE CLASSROOM

Thoughtful, well-chosen words can really make someone's day!

Everyone in the class writes a message on a slip of paper and places them in a hat – this could be a message of gratitude, a message of Christmas cheer, or celebration of someone's work.

Each day in the lead up to Christmas (or when you are in need of a little bit of extra cheer), someone can pick a slip of paper from the hat to read aloud to the class.

OPPORTUNITIES TO ADVOCATE

During Christmas, Vinnies supports many people experiencing hardship. Create an opportunity to advocate for those in our community who may be in need by talking to your school about awareness education. Consider:

- Presenting facts at an assembly (see 'Cost of Living Pressures 2024' page for ideas).
- Holding a stall, forum or event that draws attention to the particular issue you aim to highlight.
- Making posters to display around the school with info.

DONATE A CHRISTMAS GIFT

There are many children who may not have gifts under a tree this Christmas. You can purchase a new gift (ideas in this pack) or donate a pre-loved toy.

Have a look through your toys at home and pick a few that you don't use anymore - make sure that they are clean and still in good condition! Either as a class or individually, students can gather gifts and toys to drop off at the local Vinnies store.

RECYCLED WREATH

Context: We are all about recycling at the St Vincent de Paul Society (watch this video to learn more: Choose Vinnies Over Fast Fashion), and this Christmas craft brings together the use of pre-loved items and the celebration of Christmas spirit! Instead of throwing away craft scraps and less-than-perfect art materials, this activity calls for resources such as these to put together a cheerful and unique Christmas Wreath for display in classrooms or the home! Reflective questions around recycling and reusing can complement the activity, highlighting the creative ways we can show love and care for our shared home.

Age group: Suitable for primary school students.

Resources:

- Craft and fabric scraps, old craft materials such as colored paper, plain paper, pom poms, ribbons, popsicle sticks, etc.
- Paper plate, or similar sturdy card cut into a circle (base of wreath)
- Glue, tape or stapler (as needed for materials collected)
- Lengths of string

Run time: 20-40 minutes

Activity Description:

- 1. Collect materials**, students can perhaps help by bringing in materials from home! They do not have to be of Christmas colors, and blank/other paper types can be decorated with paints/drawings of Christmas themes!
- 2. Cut paper/fabric into varying strips**, Around 20 & 30cm long and about 3/5cm in width, depending on the size of the base you are using – this does not need to be precise, and varying lengths/widths will add to the unique creations.
- 3. Cut out the center of the paper plate** or cut a large circle out of thick cardstock and then cut out a middle circle to create the wreath base.
- 4. Use glue or staples** to stick the decorating materials around the wreath, sticking the ends of each strip together while looped around

circular base. This will slowly build a full and layered wreath shape and a vibrant array of color. You can also create paper candles, make drawings of loved ones or create other cheerful images to add to the center.

- 5. Attach a length of string** to hang the wreath. Display for all to enjoy!

Reflective Questions (optional):

- You may have heard of ‘Reduce, Reuse, Recycle’, can anyone tell me what they mean by reduce? (Avoiding using what we don’t need) By reuse? (finding meaning in items that may have otherwise gone to landfill) And by recycle? (to break something down into separate resources that can be used in a new way)
- Why do you think these practices are important? What impact do they seek to have?
- While they are very important, not all recyclable rubbish ends up in the recycling bin. Why do you think this is? (encourage answers that consider people from a range of circumstances, such as those who may not have access to education, or to safety.)
- What are ways we can increase access to recycling for our community? Are there other ways we can show compassion and care for our shared home?



CHRISTMAS DIARIES

Context: For some, Christmas is a time of joy. A time to be around family and friends and to celebrate in each other's company. For others, it is a time of uncertainty and hopelessness. The rising cost of living in Australia means that more individuals and families are turning to Vinnies than ever before. Vinnies is there to support through accommodation, food, referrals and a bit of hope in an otherwise hope-less season.

Age group:

Suitable for upper primary school students.

Resources:

- Ash's Journal print out (1 per group of 4)
- Jesse's Journal print out (1 per group of 4)
- Butchers Paper
- Textas

Run time: 20-30 minutes

Activity Description:

- 1. Split students** up into small groups of 4-5 and provide each group with a print out of 'Ash's Journal', a printout of 'Jesse's Journal', a sheet of butchers paper and some textas
- 2. Ask each group to read through** Ash and Jesse's journal entries
- 3. Ask each group to re-read** each Journal entry whilst considering the following questions:
 - a. How do Ash and Jesse's journal entries differ from one another?
 - b. How do you think Ash and Jesse would each be feeling on Christmas Eve?
 - c. What would Jesse's Christmas look like if it weren't for Vinnies?
- 4. Have each group share** their responses with the class
- 5. Ask each group to brainstorm** some ways that they might be able to support Australians, like Jesse, this Christmas. Have students record these on butchers paper and share with the class

Hint:

- ask students to think about how they can help as an individual, family and school

Currently dealing with...

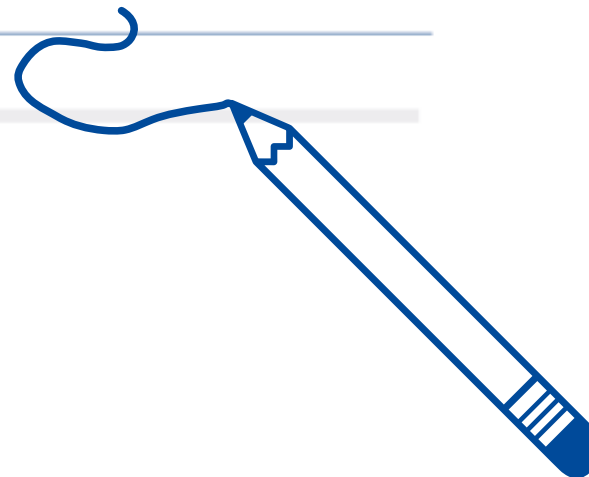
Being rushed for time. I have to finish wrapping my Mum and brothers' Christmas presents in time for Christmas day tomorrow.

TRUE COST OF CHRISTMAS

Context: During the Christmas season, Australians spend around \$30 billion on food, presents, travel, and luxuries, with an average of \$1,479 per person. This spending not only leads to more waste but also represents a missed opportunity to help those in need. The following tasks will help you explore how holiday spending could be redirected to support more compassionate and sustainable practices.

Age group: Suitable for lower and upper primary school students

Resources:

- Laptop with internet, calculator, pen

Run time: 50-60 minutes

Activity Description: Christmas comes with a lot of costs, and the three top expenses during the holiday period are travel, gifts and food.

Complete these cost comparisons and reflect on the true cost of Christmas.

Travel Expenses	
Australians spend \$10.8 billion on flights and travel during Christmas. Imagine if even 10% of this money was used to provide shelter for people experiencing homelessness.	<p>Task: Determine how many nights of shelter could be provided with 10% of Christmas travel spending (\$108,000,000).</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Research the average cost of one night of accommodation for a homeless person in Australia. • Work out how many nights of shelter could be provided with \$10.8 million.
Gifts	
Australians spend \$7.5 billion on presents during Christmas, but over 20 million unwanted gifts are received each year. This represents wasted money that could be used to help those in need.	<p>Task: Calculate the total amount of money spent on unwanted gifts and how this money might be better used.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Research the average cost of a Christmas gift in Australia. • Multiply this by 20 million to see how much money is spent. • Research the cost of supporting a child with school supplies. Calculate how many children could be gifted with school supplies with the money spent on unwanted gifts.
Food Waste	
Australians produce up to 50% more food waste during the Christmas season. More than \$36 billion worth of food is thrown away annually in Australia	<p>Task: Calculate how many meals could be provided to families in need if \$36 billion wasn't spent on un-used food each year.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Find out the average cost of a meal in Australia. • Use this information to work out how many meals \$36 billion (\$36,000,000,000) could provide.

COST-SAVVY CHRISTMAS SPENDING



Context: Research shows that around \$12 billion a year would raise 600,000 Australians out of poverty. If we were to reduce our spending at Christmas by 40%, that would be enough to fight poverty on an ongoing basis.

Research Task:

Step 1 – Use the table below to make a checklist of some of the different Christmas expenses you can think of. These could include presents for family and friends, Christmas cards and wrapping paper, food for Christmas lunch and travel costs.

Step 2 - Research the cost of each Christmas expense on your checklist. These don't have to be 100% accurate, just rough estimates of what each one might cost. For example, to calculate food costs you might visit a supermarket website for costs related to each food item.

Step 3 - Research affordable alternatives to your Christmas expenses. Think about whether there might be cheaper versions of items on your list, or whether you could replace them with second-hand or home-made alternatives. Once you have found an alternative for each expense, calculate the total cost and compare it to the expenses on your original list. See if you can reduce your Christmas spending by 40%!

Conclusion: These tasks encourage us to think about the impact of holiday spending and how making small changes could lead to positive outcomes for those in need. By understanding the cost of living during Christmas, we can explore more sustainable and compassionate ways to celebrate.

Context: In 1833, Paris, Frederic Ozanam and his friends with the support of Sister Rosalie Rendu formed what we know today as the St Vincent de Paul Society. When people unite to assist a particular cause, people experience disadvantage can better survive, flourish and have a hope filled future.

Age group: Suitable for upper secondary school students.

Resources:

- Serving the Community worksheet (see Appendix)
- Laptop / tablet (minimum one per group)
- Pens / Pencils

Run time: 30-45 minutes

Activity Description:

1. **Split the class** into groups of 4
2. Provide each group with a Serving the Community worksheet
3. **Students to work within their groups to create a mock-service.** Each group will have to agree on a cause (eg. homelessness, asylum seekers, child poverty) and research the topic to assist them in completing the worksheet.
4. **Students to present** their service and findings to the class
